



SDC offers GED/High School Equivalency Diploma (HSED) programs that help students earn a high school diploma, increase career opportunities and earning potential.

The highly-structured and intensive HSED program meets four days a week, for 16 weeks. SDC offers day and evening classes to accommodate a variety of schedules. The curriculum consists of three parts:

- Mathematics
- Communications
- Pathways (Civics, Social Studies, Science, Health, and Employability)





To earn a GED, a student must pass four subject exams and a civics test. Students prepare for the tests through self-paced, individualized instruction and group instruction. Students take practice tests, called GED-ready, to monitor their progress and gauge readiness for taking the official tests.

If you are interested in earning a GED in Wisconsin, you must meet certain requirements:

Age: Provide proof that you are least 18½ years old or that your ninth grade class has graduated from high school. Students age 17 to 18½ years old may only be served through a school district or special program.

Residency: Provide proof that you have resided in Wisconsin for at least 10 days.

Application: Complete an application form at the initial meeting and pay a testing and credential fee.

Pearson VUE Testing Center

TSDC is a certified Pearson VUE testing site. There are more than 450 credentialed owners/companies that have their exams administered. The test owners/companies serve nearly every industry. Testing includes academia and admissions (GED testing), financial and related services, government, information technology (IT), military, U.S. licensing and global regulatory.

Participants must be Milwaukee County residents, 18 years of age or older and have a high school diploma or equivalency.
